

Sabbath and Sabbatical

For a very brief time my kids had a Bible picture book that got on my nerves. They had it for a brief time, since I found it a new home once I realized that we never read it, because it annoyed me. How, one might ask, could one be annoyed by a Bible picture book, especially when one is a pastor? Well, the very first Bible story in this Bible picture book was the story of creation, as it is told in Genesis 1:1-1:31. The book

portrayed, the creation of the light and day and night (Genesis 1:3-5), the dome/sky (Genesis 1:6-8), the dry land and the seas, and the vegetation on the earth (Genesis 1:9-13); the sun, the moon, and the stars (Genesis 1:14-19); the birds, and the fish (Genesis 1:20-23), the animals (Genesis 1:24-25); and humanity (Genesis 1:26-31). And that is where the story stopped, with two human creatures, male and female, who later in Genesis, were given the names, "Adam" and "Eve". The implication of the story as it was told in that Bible story book was that humanity was the pinnacle of God's creation. But that is not how the actual Bible tells the story. The story in Genesis continues into chapter two where we find these words:

Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their multitude. And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation. (Genesis 2:1-3)

The final thing that is created is Sabbath, a time for the creation to rest. That is the pinnacle of creation.

Later in the Biblical story, this Sabbath rest, that was built into the fabric of creation, becomes one of God's commandments. It is a rest that is commanded for all living things, including servants, strangers, and animals. We find this commandment in Exodus 20:8-11:

Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labor and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the LORD your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the LORD blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

The word "sabbath" is the root word of the word "sabbatical". This summer, beginning on July 1, our wonderful church musician, Gabby Heath, is going to be taking a sabbatical. This means that she is going to be taking a rest from her usual work here at Emmanuel, of planning and leading and playing the music for our Sunday morning worship services. Gabby will be back in early September, in time for our return to two services and the beginning of the 2019-2020 choir season. This time of rest for Gabby will enable her to have free weekends to spend time with her family when they are free from their own work schedules.

Gabby's sabbatical was recommended by the Mutual Ministry Committee, approved by the Church Council, and is being planned for by the Worship Team. In order for this to be a paid sabbatical, the

Council found money to pay for substitute musicians while Gabby is away outside of the regular church budget.

We are inviting substitute church musicians to come and play while Gabby is away and have most of the Sundays in the summer covered already. We also have a team of 10 people who will be planning the music for this year's summer worship services. Because we will be having guest musicians all summer we will not be able to have *Hymns from the Hat*, but that will give us something to look forward to for the summer of 2020. We should feel very blessed to have a church musician like Gabby, who is able to play anything that comes out the hat without any previous review or practice.

We are blessed to have Gabby as a part of our church community and we are blessed to be able to offer her this time of rest!

Being Welcoming and Providing Nursery Care

Children are a vital and welcome part of our worship services here at Emmanuel. We rejoice in being able to worship the Lord in the company of all of our sisters and brothers in Christ, from the youngest to the oldest. However, we have heard from some parents of young children that sometimes it is a challenge for the youngest among us to stay engaged during the whole worship service, which makes it hard for their parents to focus on worship as well. During our "Why Emmanuel" sessions many people shared with us that worship on Sundays helped them to recharge their spiritual and emotional batteries for the week ahead and as much as we love to

mental, spiritual, and emotional batteries for the week ahead and as much as we love to have children in worship, we also want parents to be able to have that chance to recharge and reconnect with God during worship as well.

We want to help parents and children all have a positive experience at Emmanuel so, to that end, beginning **on May 26th at our 9:30 a.m.** service, we will be offering nursery care during worship for children up to age 4. Every week two Nursery Attendants will be available downstairs in the Gathering Room so that children can be dropped off for care. If there are no children dropped off in the Nursery prior to the service, the Nursery Attendants will come to worship and sit in the back row on the right (as you face the altar). If at any point parents of young children decide that their children could use a break in the Nursery, the Nursery Attendants will be available to go downstairs with the children and sit with them for as long as the parents would like.

Every week we will need two adult Nursery Attendants (unrelated and over the age of 18). Teens younger than 18 are also welcome to help offer Nursery care, but they will work alongside two adult Nursery Attendants.
