Emmanuel on the Move

Back in 2017 our congregation took a survey called the CAT, the Congregational Assessment Tool, to help us better understand our identity as a congregation and our priorities moving forward. One of those priorities, identified by people across the age spectrum in our congregation was called Priority 3. Priority 3 was "Provide direct services to those living on the margins of society (i.e. homeless, transient,

migrant, people).

Emmanuel is a caring community of faith and when people have needs, we step up. Later in this issue of the Envoy you will read that we raised \$680.00 and filled a car trunk with non-perishable food items for the Souper Bowl of Caring. People are meeting every week at our church to make quilts for Lutheran World Relief in our 11th year of quilting. Over the years we have sent hundreds of health care kits and school kits to Lutheran World Relief. There are thank you notes hanging on one of our bulletin boards thanking us for the Christmas gifts we sent to kids in Ascentria's intensive foster care program. Every month our Matthew 25 fund helps people who are in need of rental help, food, gas, car repairs, and other things. I could go on and on, but you get the idea. Emmanuel is a community that feels called to help when people need help. But Priority 3 tells us something *else*. Priority 3 tells us that we're ready to get our hands dirty. We're ready to provide direct service, to look people in the eyes, to leave our safe space to go where people are, to enter into the realities of the complexities of other people's lives, to be changed and to bring relationship.

The challenging thing is, that we're not exactly sure what that would look like. Emmanuel is a busy church with lots of things that people can be involved in. What we don't want is just one more thing that is on the buffet of activities and opportunities that people can be involved in at Emmanuel. We want something that can be part of the life and the fabric of our community, something that we all can feel invested in. In order to find "that thing", the Forward Leadership Team has asked some questions over the past two years. We sent out a survey, we had a forum, we went through the *Why Emmanuel* process. Every time we did one of those things, we learned something important about this congregation. We learned even more fully than we already knew it that this is a congregation that deeply values our commitment to and care for each other and that is willing to embrace as family whoever walks through our doors. We learned that this is a congregation where people deeply value the opportunity to use their gifts to make the world a better place. We learned that there is a huge spectrum among people at Emmanuel in terms of community needs that they have identified and way that they think that they should be addressed. What we didn't learn is what we should do, what problem we should tackle, how we should get involved in the needs of the larger community.


So, this is where we have decided to start. Rather than die from paralysis by analysis, we have decided to **look for** opportunities to get into the world and do some good, and then to reflect on the experiences that we have to decide if the things that we tried are ways we would like to continue to be involved, either by starting some new ministry through our church or by partnering with other organizations. We are going to learn by **doing**.

When we first started talking about this in our Forward Leadership Team meetings, I started calling it the Hebrews 10:24 Initiative (I have a thing about naming things after scripture passages.). Hebrews 10:24 says, "And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds..." I also called it the "Provoking Initiative." Thank goodness wiser minds than mine prevailed and we are calling this "Emmanuel On the Move".

Our first Emmanuel On the Move opportunity will happen on **Saturday, May 2nd, 9:00-12:00** at the Pine Street Inn in Boston. We will take 8-10 volunteers to help prepare a meal for the guests at the Inn on that day. There might be another opportunity to serve in that area on the same day, so that we could involve more volunteers. Watch for more information about Emmanuel On the Move in the coming weeks and months.

We'll be actively seeking out other ways to serve, other groups to partner with, and other ways to live out Priority 3. Priority 3 is simply a way of saying that we want to follow where Jesus walked, to meet people where they are, to be present to people and on the margins, and to share good news and help and hope with all people.

We begin the season of Lent with two opportunities for worship on Ash Wednesday **February 26th**. We will gather at **3 pm and 7:30 pm**. The imposition of ashes and Holy

Communion will be offered at both services.

Midweek Lenten Soup Supper & Worship - 6:00 - 7:30 p.m.

Lenten Soup Suppers and Evening Prayer Services will be held on five Wednesdays during Lent, starting on Wednesday, March 4th.

Dinner will be from 6:00-6:45 and worship will be held from 6:45-7:30. If you would like to bring soup or bread for the Soup Suppers, please sign up on the table in the hallway outside of the pastor's office.

The theme of our Lenten Midweek Services is

everyday spirituality, inspired by Bishop Hazelwood's book of the same title, Everyday Spirituality. Each evening our speaker during worship will be focusing either on a way in which he or she consistently experience's God's presence as a part of his or her daily life or on a time in his or her life when he or she experienced God's presence in a meaningful and unexpected way, that was not connected to worship or church life.

Our focus on everyday spirituality will also extend to our Lenten Soup Suppers. During our meals people will be encouraged to sit with different people every week. Bishop Hazelwood has designed decks of discussion cards that will help people talk to each other about facets of their everyday lives as well as about their experience of spirituality. The plan is for us to use those cards to get to know each other better as we share a meal.

Snow Cancellation Policy

I can always get to church, but there are times when it is not safe or community minded for other people to venture out to come to worship.



The reality is that the church of Jesus Christ can never be closed. As long as the people of God engage in prayer for their neighbors, especially those who are put at risk because of dangerous weather, the work and worship of the church goes forward. But, there are times when worship services can and should be cancelled.

This might not come up this coming winter (we can only hope), but if it looks like a storm is coming that will bring significant snow or other seriously dangerous weather to our area, then worship at Emmanuel will be cancelled.

I will let people know about a cancellation, by changing the phone message at church, sending out a mass e-mail, putting it on Facebook, and putting it on local TV stations. If you hear the words, "Blizzard expected Saturday into Sunday morning" this winter, chances are good that worship at Emmanuel will be cancelled! *Pastor Amanda*

Thank you so much for your generous giving to the Souper Bowl of Caring! In addition to taking an impressive amount of food to the Norwood Food Pantry, we also collected \$680.00.

The Confirmation students had a meaningful discussion about how to allocate the money that was collected. They were very thoughtful in their approach to this important question. Finally, they decided that the "proceeds" from this year's Souper Bowl of Caring should go the food pantries located in the towns represented by the students in the Confirmation class. Since the non-perishable food items that were collected went to the Norwood Food Pantry the students decided that the money that was collected should be split between the other two food pantries. Therefore, the Westwood Food Pantry and Lenore's Pantry (the food pantry that is located in North Attleboro) will receive \$340.00 each.

Every year that I go through this decision-making process with the Confirmation students the outcome is different, but the process is the same. The students take their responsibility to distribute these funds very seriously and exhibit a depth of concern about how to faithfully and effectively address local and global hunger that is encouraging and inspiring. In addition to helping fight local and global hunger, your donations to the Souper Bowl of Caring help our youth to have the meaningful experience of being trusted by their community of faith to make this important decision.

Lent and Everyday Spirituality

This Lent, in our Lenten midweek soup suppers and evening prayer worship services and during 10:00-11:00 a.m. Sunday Morning Studies, will be exploring Bishop Jim Hazelwood's book, <u>Everyday Spirituality</u>.

On Sundays, we will follow a Lenten study guide prepared by Bishop Hazelwood, that explores different chapters of his book as they go along with the themes of the gospel readings that will be read in worship.



Here are the chapters that we will be exploring:

Sunday, March 1 The First Sunday in Lent

Readings: Matthew 4:1-11 and Everyday Spirituality Chapter 22 Surrender

Sunday, March 8 The Second Sunday in Lent

Readings: John 3:1-17 and Everyday Spirituality Chapter 11 Trust

Sunday, March 15 The Third Sunday in Lent

Readings: John 4:5-42 and Everyday Spirituality Chapter 12 Question

Sunday, March 22 The Fourth Sunday in Lent

Readings: John 9:1-41 and Everyday Spirituality Chapter 24 Disagree

Sunday, March 29 The Fifth Sunday in Lent

Readings: John 11:1-45 and Everyday Spirituality Chapter 9 Laugh

Sunday, April 5 Palm Sunday/The Sunday of the Passion

Readings: Matthew 21:1-11 and Everyday Spirituality Chapter 26 Grieve
